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## Argentina

Argentina was not a Member of the 1999 Food Aid Convention and its extensions.

## Australia

### 1. Product description

All Australian food assistance is in fully grant form and cash-based.

### 2. Quantity and/or value of food aid provided

All Australian food assistance is fully in grant form and is cash-based.

In the 2013/2014 financial year, Australia provided AUD 360.5<sup>2</sup> million for programmes related to countries developing their food security, agricultural productivity and infrastructure, within the ambit of the *Decision on Measures Concerning the Possible Negative Effects of the Reform Programme on Least-Developed and Net Food-Importing Developing Countries*. Of this, over AUD 205.9 million was directed to LDCs/NFIDCs.

### 3. Description of whether food aid is provided on in-kind, untied cash-based basis and whether monetization was permitted

All Australian food assistance is provided fully in grant form and is cash-based and is untied.

### 4. Description of whether in fully grant form or concessional terms

All Australian food assistance is provided in fully grant form and cash-based.

## 5. Description of relevant needs assessment (and by whom) and whether food aid is responding to a declaration of emergency or an emergency appeal (and by whom)

All Australian food assistance is in fully grant form and cash-based. Flexible financial support allows the United Nations World Food Programme, Australia's largest humanitarian partner, maximum flexibility to procure and deliver food assistance efficiently, effectively and in the most timely way possible to those in need in response to declarations of emergency or emergency appeals.

## 6. Description of whether re-export of food aid is an option under the terms of the provision of food aid

All Australian food assistance is cash-based and as such, re-export is not applicable.

## Brazil

### 1. Product description

In 2014, the Brazilian Government donated polished rice as food aid.

### 2. Quantity and/or value of food aid provided

2014: Polished rice – 12,100 metric tonnes – USD 5,744,584.

### 3. Description of whether food aid is provided on in-kind, untied cash-based basis and whether monetization was permitted

The food aid provided by the Brazilian Government was granted in-kind and monetization was not allowed.

### 4. Description of whether in fully grant form or concessional terms

The Brazilian food aid was provided in fully grant form.

## 5. Description of relevant needs assessment (and by whom) and whether food aid is responding to a declaration of emergency or an emergency appeal (and by whom)

Currently, the Brazilian Government provides food aid through the World Food Programme (WFP) of the United Nations, focusing on Emergency Operations and Protracted Relief and Recovery Operations, which target victims of socio-environmental disasters and vulnerable groups to guarantee their food and nutritional security.

## 6. Description of whether re-export of food aid is an option under the terms of the provision of food aid

In order to avoid commercial displacement, the re-export of food aid is not allowed by the Brazilian Government. Re-exports may occur only in special circumstances, such as when the World Food Programme (WFP) recommends and endorses it for the mitigation of the negative effects on the nutritional status of vulnerable groups arising from emergencies (e.g. pipeline breaks).

Canada's minimum annual commitment of food assistance is expressed in terms of value. Therefore, information is no longer available on a product-by-product basis. In 2013, Canada exceeded its CAD 250 million minimum annual contribution commitment under the Convention, and provided CAD 374 million in food assistance. ## China

China provides food aid as humanitarian relief in times of emergencies. The food aid programmes are small in size, having no influences on the international market. China provides aid in response to emergency requests from the UN World Food Programme or countries in need. All aid is provided in grant form with no conditions attached. China does not limit the beneficiaries' right to monetize or re-export the aid.

On 27 July 2011, the Chinese Government provided food aid of RMB 90 million to the Horn of Africa through the United Nations World Food Programme after the UN declared that Somalia was suffering from famine on 20 July. On 15 August, upon request, China provides food aid of RMB 353 million to African countries, namely Ethiopia, Kenya, Somalia and Djibouti. On 6 September, China provides RMB 90 million to Zimbabwe as food aid, as requested by the Zimbabwe Government.

In addition, the Chinese Government provided food aid worth USD 2 million, respectively, to Guinea, Sierra Leone and Liberia through the UN World Food Programme in November 2014, in the fight against Ebola.

## Switzerland

### 1. Product description

Swiss food aid is made up of aid in kind in the form of dairy products (whole milk powder, skimmed milk powder, and cheese) and aid in cash. The final destination of the aid in cash is determined by international organizations, *inter alia*, under the World Food Program (WFP).

### 2. Quantity and/or value of food aid provided

Switzerland has significantly increased its contributions to the WFP, from approximately CHF 50 million in 2008 to CHF 79 million in 2013 and CHF 82 million in 2014. For the period 2013 to 2016, the Swiss Parliament approved a credit of CHF 20 million per year for the purchase of Swiss dairy products in kind for the most vulnerable populations. This corresponds to 2,546 tonnes worth of in-kind food aid in 2013 and 2,839 tonnes in 2014.

### 3. Description of whether food aid is provided on in-kind, untied cash-based basis and whether monetization was permitted

Aid-in-kind in the form of dairy products is provided in the form of deliveries of dairy products of Swiss origin, largely through the WFP. In addition to direct aid in the form of food products, Swiss humanitarian aid is provided in the form of financial contributions. The contributions to the WFP comprise of payments that are earmarked for specific WFP operation as well as payments that the WFP may use as it sees fit. In order to stimulate the markets and local production in the countries concerned and to honour the commitments assumed under the Food Assistance Convention, Switzerland encourages the purchase of local or regional goods.

During the period in question, Switzerland did not resort to the monetization of its food aid (in kind and in cash) and Switzerland's food aid was untied.

### 4. Description of whether in fully grant form or concessional terms

All Swiss food aid is provided on fully grant terms and not on concessional terms in addition to the WFP criteria (see question 5).

### 5. Description of relevant needs assessment (and by whom) and whether food aid is responding to a declaration of emergency or an emergency appeal (and by whom)

Switzerland works closely with the WFP. It contributes to WFP operations in accordance with the criteria defined by this programme. Swiss powdered milk is supplied in kind and distributed according to the nutritional needs of children, pregnant and lactating women, and persons suffering from HIV/AIDS or tuberculosis. The allocation of any contribution is discussed with the WFP, and the WFP's opinion and emergency appeals are taken into account.

## United States of America

During U.S. Fiscal Year 2015, the United States shipped 1.09 million metric tons of food products with a total value of USD 447.25 million to meet emergency and developmental food aid needs. In addition to this in-kind food aid, the United States also provided USD 1.09 billion through cash, vouchers, and locally procured commodities. The U.S. food aid assisted with emergency needs in countries or regions such as Syria, the Horn of Africa, and the Sahel. Along with the U.S. responses to emergency situations, the food aid supported school feeding, health, and agricultural development activities.

### 1. Product description

The reported quantity for years 2013-2015 provided in the table are produced by a new U.S. Government accounting system. The new system has resulted in revised quantities for 2013 and 2014. The years 2011 and 2012 are reported in previous reports under the old system. The system is also used by USAID and USDA, and assists with achieving consistency across U.S. Government reporting.

### **3. Description of whether food aid is provided on in-kind, untied cash-based basis and whether monetization is permitted**

The United States provides a mix of in-kind food aid, cash transfers, vouchers, and locally procured food. During Fiscal Year 2015, the United States provided 1.09 million tonnes of in-kind food aid with a total value of USD 447.25 million. Monetization is permitted and used to cover transportation costs, support health or nutrition activities, or fund agricultural or development activities.

### **4. Description of whether in fully grant form or concessional terms**

All US food assistance is provided on grant terms.

### **5. Description of Needs Assessments**

Food assistance responses to emergencies are provided through the World Food Program, private voluntary organizations, and other qualified responders to emergencies. The organizations work closely with the national and local governments in the recipient countries to identify the recipient regions and beneficiaries who need the programs.

For developmental food aid that is distributed directly to beneficiaries, the U.S. Government and its implementing organizations work closely with the national and local governments to identify regions and beneficiaries. Needs assessments are based on recipient government statistics that identify areas of poverty and nutritional deficiencies. This targeting is intended to increase the consumption of food among the beneficiaries.

A limited portion of the in-kind food aid is monetized. The U.S. Government works with the implementing organizations and the recipient governments to analyse the markets and choose commodities that will not disrupt local production, prices, local markets, or commercial trade. The selected commodities are intended to address shortfalls in consumption due to limitations in production, trade, or income. Monetizations are conducted in countries that have low income, high stunting rates, limited foreign exchange, and limited access to trade-financing credit. The implementing organizations conduct public solicitations to ensure that a wide range of buyers are informed and to encourage competition to ensure that the sales occur at price levels that do not undercut commercial transactions.

### **6. Allowance for Re-Export**

All US food assistance is directed to specific recipient countries. Re-export of the assistance is not allowed.
